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ST. LOUIS SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA ANNOUNCES DETAILS OF NEW CHAMBER MUSIC SERIES IN COLLABORATION WITH THE SHELDON

Five-concert St. Louis Symphony Orchestra: Live at The Sheldon series curated by SLSO musicians begins October 25

Each concert features a new work by a student composer at the University of Missouri, including four world premieres, part of a long-standing partnership with the Mizzou New Music Initiative

Concerts include music by Ludwig van Beethoven, Franz Biebl, Valerie Coleman, Antonín Dvořák, Paul Hindemith, Bohuslav Martinů, Jessie Montgomery, W.A. Mozart, Carl Nielsen, Florence Price, Christian Quiñones, Maurice Ravel, Franz Schubert, Jean Sibelius, Louis Spohr, Richard Strauss, Igor Stravinsky, Richard Wagner, Shannon Wood, plus five University of Missouri student composers

(September 28, 2023, St. Louis, MO) – Today, the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra announced details for a new, five-concert chamber music series in collaboration with The Sheldon. Showcasing the talents of SLSO musicians in smaller ensembles, the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra: Live at The Sheldon series presents a wide variety of chamber music at the SLSO's neighbor in Grand Center, known for its exceptional acoustics and intimate atmosphere. Curated and performed by SLSO musicians, concerts spotlight the musicians and the instruments they play with programming that spans chamber music repertoire. From beloved standards to the first performances of music by established and emerging composers of today, the series presents 14 pieces performed by the SLSO for the first time.

The inaugural concert takes place on October 25, featuring SLSO woodwind players and curated by Principal Clarinetist Scott Andrews and Principal Bassoonist Andrew Cuneo. Future concerts feature musicians from the SLSO's strings, piano, percussion, and horn sections with concerts curated by violinist Angie Smart and cellist Bjorn Ranheim (December 6); Concertmaster David Halen and Principal Second Violinist Alison Harney (February 7); Principal Timpanist Shannon Wood (March 6); and Principal Horn Roger Kaza and Fourth Horn Julie Thayer (April 7).

The series is sponsored by the Sinquefield Charitable Foundation.

Marie-Hélène Bernard, SLSO President and CEO, said, "Giving a voice to our musicians to explore chamber repertoire and elevate their superb artistry through this new collaboration is very exciting. We are delighted to continue a meaningful partnership with The Sheldon near our home in Grand Center as the expansion and renovation of Powell Hall is in full swing. This new series builds on our





long partnerships with The Sheldon and the University of Missouri, in our shared mission to present engaging chamber experiences for our audiences while uplifting emerging musical voices."

Peter Palermo, Executive Director of The Sheldon, said, "The Sheldon has been a gathering place for St. Louis' finest musicians for over a century. This new partnership allows us to continue that great tradition. The Sheldon's perfect acoustics coupled with SLSO's incomparable musicians will make any chamber music lover's dreams come true. We are delighted to partner with SLSO and bring these concerts to our community."

Concerts this season include works by Ludwig van Beethoven, Antonín Dvořák, Maurice Ravel, and Richard Strauss; paired alongside lesser-heard voices including Bohuslav Martinů, Florence Price, and Louis Spohr; and composers of today including Valerie Coleman, Jessie Montgomery, Christian Quiñones, and Shannon Wood (SLSO Principal Timpanist). Unique to these concerts, the series also includes the first SLSO performances of five chamber music pieces—four of which are world premieres—composed by emerging artists at the University of Missouri, continuing a long-standing and multi-faceted partnership with the Mizzou New Music Initiative that includes full orchestral performances of student compositions and mentoring opportunities.

Tickets start at \$31 (\$15 for students) and are on sale now.

In addition to this new series, the SLSO performs a full season of orchestral programs under the leadership of Music Director Stéphane Denève and renowned guest conductors alongside the world's great visiting soloists. Programming includes orchestral performances featuring timeless masterpieces to exciting collaborations; the 20th anniversary season of the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra: Live at the Pulitzer, which features chamber ensemble performances celebrating music of today; a variety of holiday concerts, film concerts, and concerts with popular artists; Family and Education concerts, part of a portfolio of education programming that and serves more than 330,000 teachers and students annually; and a variety of community concerts.

While the transformative expansion and renovation of historic Powell Hall continues, the SLSO will perform classical concerts at two landmark performance venues: the Touhill Performing Arts Center at the University of Missouri–St. Louis and Stifel Theatre in downtown St. Louis. Additional concerts take place at The Sheldon, the Pulitzer Arts Foundation, the J. Scheidegger Center for Performing Arts at Lindenwood University, and throughout the region.
