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ST. LOUIS SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA NOVEMBER CONCERTS INCLUDE FIRST LIVE AT THE PULITZER CONCERT OF THE SEASON, OPERA MASTERPIECE, ARTIST DEBUTS, AND PERFORMANCES THROUGHOUT THE REGION

On November 3 and 5, Stéphane Denève, The Joseph and Emily Rauh Pulitzer Music Director, leads the orchestra and pianist Paul Lewis in his SLSO debut in Ludwig van Beethoven's Fourth Piano Concerto, the third installment in a season-long cycle of Beethoven piano concerti; concerts also include Maurice Ravel's *Le Tombeau de Couperin* and Sergei Prokofiev's Symphony No. 1, "Classical"

Conductor James Gaffigan leads the SLSO and St. Louis Symphony Chorus in monumental performances of Pietro Mascagni's *Cavalleria rusticana* in concert, featuring a vocal cast including soprano Heidi Melton, tenor Antonio Poli, contralto Meredith Arwady, baritone Anthony Clark Evans, and mezzo-soprano Katherine Beck, November 11-12

The first of three St. Louis Symphony Orchestra: Live at the Pulitzer performances features chamber music by Sky Macklay, Leilehua Lanzilotti, Molly Joyce, Michael Gordon, and Andy Akiho, November 14

On November 17-19, conductor Christian Reif and violinist Randall Goosby makes their SLSO debuts in a program that includes the first SLSO performances of Vítězslava Kaprálová's *Rustic Suite,* Erich Wolfgang Korngold's Violin Concerto, and Antonín Dvořák's Symphony No. 7

On Thanksgiving weekend, SLSO strings perform Antonio Vivaldi's *The Four Seasons* and Astor Piazzolla's *The Four Seasons of Buenos Aires* at three locations throughout the region, featuring Concertmaster David Halen and Associate Concertmaster Erin Schreiber

(October 9, 2023, St. Louis, MO) – Today, the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra announced details of its November 2023 concerts, which include classical favorites by Ludwig van Beethoven, Maurice Ravel, and Antonín Dvořák; monumental performances of an opera in concert; performances of *The Four Seasons* throughout the community; and the first St. Louis Symphony Orchestra: Live at the Pulitzer, featuring music by composers of today.

Tickets start at \$15 for classical concerts and are on sale now. Tickets may be purchased at <u>slso.org</u> or by calling the Box Office at 314-534-1700. A full concert calendar is available at <u>slso.org</u> or on the SLSO's mobile app available for iOS or Android. Classical concerts will be broadcast on November 4





and 18 on 90.7 FM KWMU St. Louis Public Radio, Classic 107.3, and <u>online</u>. Audiences can attend a Pre-Concert Conversation, an engaging discussion about the music and artists on the program, one hour prior to each classical concert.

While the expansion and renovation of Powell Hall continues, the SLSO will perform November concerts at several venues throughout the region: the Touhill Performing Arts Center at the University of Missouri–St. Louis (November 3, 5, 17-19), Stifel Theatre in downtown St. Louis (November 11-12), the Pulitzer Arts Foundation in Grand Center (November 14), St. Joseph Catholic Church Cottleville (November 24), Manchester United Methodist Church in Manchester (November 25), and The Sheldon in Grand Center (November 26). Shuttle service will be available for concerts at the Touhill at UMSL and Stifel Theatre starting at \$15 per seat. There will be two shuttle pick-up locations for performances at Stifel Theatre: Plaza Frontenac and St. Louis Community College–Forest Park. Shuttles for performances at the Touhill Performing Arts Center at UMSL will depart from Plaza Frontenac and free parking is available on the UMSL campus.

Orpheus was Greek mythology's superstar musician. Music Director Stéphane Denève brings two responses to the myth, the bewitching beauty of Christoph Willibald Gluck's *Orfeo ed Euridice* and Beethoven's Fourth Piano Concerto. Pianist Paul Lewis is among the world's great Beethoven pianists, offering what *Gramophone* Magazine calls "shining musicianship." The sprightliness of Sergei Prokofiev's *Classical Symphony* and Maurice Ravel's *Le Tombeau de Couperin* refreshes audiences with a splash of colors, vivid lights, and rich tonal variety.

Sicily, 1900. A beautiful place with a passionate underbelly. The perfect setting for Pietro Mascagni's legendary *Cavalleria rusticana*, a compelling story of love and betrayal. Turiddu and Lola have happily rekindled their old love, but Lola's husband finds out, and Santuzza feels betrayed, all with dire consequences. Conductor James Gaffigan brings an international reputation as an opera conductor, and he tells this tale with white-hot intensity with a cast of all-star operatic vocalists at the St. Louis Symphony Chorus in its first of four collaborations with the SLSO in the 23/24 season.

SLSO musicians summon intense color and bold abstraction in the first of three Live at the Pulitzer concerts, a chamber music series celebrating musical voices of today marking its 20th season. String quartets take us on kaleidoscopic journeys through Sky Macklay's angular reimagination of the familiar cadence and Molly Joyce's reflection on perfection. Michael Gordon and Leilehua Lanzilotti revel in the emotive beauty of solo instruments. A lone marimba breaks up the string party in Andy Akiho's virtuosic and percussive banger—all performed in the striking atmosphere of the Pulitzer Arts Foundation.

Young American violinist Randall Goosby is the talk of the classical music world. His sensitive soul and stage charm are irresistible. He makes his SLSO debut with Erich Wolfgang Korngold's Violin Concerto, a work that sings with the beauty of the master film composer's scores. Christian Reif, another rising star, makes his SLSO debut conducting two pieces with turbulently rousing folk music at their core: Antonín Dvořák's Seventh Symphony, and Vítězslava Kaprálová's *Rustic Suite*.
