ST. LOUIS SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA ANNOUNCES DETAILS FOR HOLIDAY CONCERTS AT POWELL HALL AT THE JACK C. TAYLOR MUSIC CENTER

Double reed instruments take the spotlight in a chamber music concert at The Sheldon, December 4, curated by oboist Xiomara Mass and bassoonist Julia Paine

Frequent guest conductor John Storgårds leads the first SLSO performances of Clara Wieck Schumann's Three Romances, Haydn's Cello Concerto in C major with Kian Soltani in his SLSO debut, and Dmitri Shostakovich's Symphony No. 15, December 5-6

Conductor Nicholas McGegan leads the orchestra, St. Louis Symphony Chorus, and soloists Sherezade Panthaki, Sara Couden, John Matthew Myers, and Philippe Sly in G.F. Handel's timeless masterpiece, *Messiah*, December 12-14

The orchestra teams up with the St. Louis Symphony IN UNISON Chorus and the Clark Sisters for an annual tradition, IN UNISON Christmas, led by Kevin McBeth, December 18-19

Stuart Malina leads the annual Mercy Holiday Celebration, featuring vocalist Kennedy Holmes, December 20-23

The orchestra continues its film series with the John Williams-scored holiday hit, *Home Alone*, December 27-28

(October 30, 2025, St. Louis, MO) – Today, the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra announced details of its December 2025 concerts, inviting audiences to experience the magic of live orchestral music during the holiday season. Most concerts take place at Powell Hall at the Jack C. Taylor Music Center, which will be bedecked in holiday decorations for the first time since a two-year transformational expansion and renovation. Concerts include beloved holiday traditions like the IN UNISON Christmas and Mercy Holiday Celebration concerts, G.F. Handel's *Messiah*, performances of the score to *Home Alone*, and more.

Conductor John Storgårds, a frequent SLSO collaborator, returns to lead a kaleidoscopic program that begins with the first SLSO performances of Clara Schumann's Three Romances, arranged for orchestra by Benjamin de Murashkin. Wistful and intimate, Schumann's work gracefully represents her musical output—primary focusing on music for piano. Joseph Haydn's Cello Concerto, though exceptionally difficult to master, is leisurely and elegant. Cellist Kian Soltani, whose emotional connection with audiences has captivated many, makes his St. Louis debut. Then, Dmitri Shostakovich's final symphony, his Fifteenth, is a blend of the composer's memories, transformed into an epic symphonic memoir with calls to other famous works, including the *William Tell* Overture.

G.F. Handel Messiah

G.F. Handel's *Messiah* has stood the test of time. Originally written as a retelling of Jesus' life through text compiled from the King James Bible, the oratorio has gained prominence as a holiday favorite, especially the "Hallelujah Chorus." Nicholas McGegan, one of the world's foremost experts on Handel's music, conducts the SLSO and St. Louis Symphony Chorus in this beloved holiday tradition. Joining McGegan is a quartet of vocal soloists, including soprano Sherezade Panthaki, mezzo-soprano Sara Couden in her SLSO debut, tenor John Matthew Myers, and bass-baritone Philippe Sly.
